Safeguarding Information for Visitors





What do I do if I am worried about a child?

If you become concerned about:

- Something a child says
- Injuries or bruising on a child
- Changes in a child's behaviour or demeanour

Please report these concerns to a member of the safeguarding team **immediately** (see photos of designated staff in this leaflet).

Child abuse happens to all children regardless of gender, culture, religion, social background and those with or without a disability so we must have the attitude that '**it could happen here**.

What do I do if a child makes a disclosure?

- Listen carefully to the child, particularly what is said spontaneously.
- Remember not to show shock or disbelief.
- Do not promise confidentiality.
- Reassure the child but do not make promises that might not be possible to keep.
- Do not interrogate or ask leading questions.
- Reassure the child that is not their fault ; stress that it was right to tell.
- Speak to a member of the designated safeguarding team immediately, please do not leave it.



Our school welcomes visitors to the school and expects all visitors to comply with all school procedures, particularly those in respect of Health & Safety and Safeguarding & Child Welfare. At St. Mark's, w recognise that visitors can make an important contribution to the life and work of the school and that visitors themselves can benefit from contact with pupils and staff.

As a visitor to our school, we will require you to do the following in this order:

- 1. Report to the main school office
- 2. Sign in on the entry signage system
- 3. Receive a sign in badge and landyard (please wear at all times)
- 4. Listen carefully to the safeguarding and the fire evacuation procedures
- 5. Depending on the purpose of your visit, you will be given information by the office team accordingly.

Health and Safety Fire

In the event of a fire alarm, please follow and use the nearest fire exit (signposted around school). Please make yourself aware of the nearest fire exit.

Accidents and Illness

All accidents, regardless of severity, need to be reported to a first aider and the principal, Mrs. Linley. There are posters displayed around school showing who the first aiders are and who Mrs. Linley is.

Equality

We are committed to providing a positive working environment which is free from prejudice and unlawful discrimination and any form of harassment, bullying or victimisation. We have developed a number of key policies to ensure that the principles of Catholic Social Teaching in relation to human dignity and dignity in work become embedded into every aspect of school life and these policies are reviewed regularly in this regard.

<u>Behaviour</u>
